Many friends in these areas are still waiting for relief supplies to arrive, have lost their homes and are living in shelters and queuing every day for food, kerosene and water. All of them without fail, however, are amazingly genki and stoic in their present condition, and I have every faith that it is this kind of attitude and resoluteness that will see the people of Tohoku rebuilding their lives and their cities again in the very near future.

While it is hard to always see the silver lining in events as catastrophic and seemingly senseless as this one, one of our members, Michelle Smith, mentioned at our JETAASA lunch recently that the earthquake has made many of us reconnect with our friends in Japan and breathe new life into our relationships with them. I think this is so true, and I for one, am so grateful to be in touch with so many of my good Japanese friends once again. It has also made me realise how important it is to have a support group of people here, who understand how important our connection with Japan is and that has made me even more grateful for JETAASA and the opportunity it gives us support each other during times like these.

I hope many more of you will join our events this year and also help us in our continuing fundraising efforts for Japan relief – this is the year when we can all give back as much to Japan as it has given to us.

TThe JETAA International Meeting was held in the beautiful city of Edinburgh, Scotland at the beginning of October last year. As well as a Japanese delegation from Clair and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) and the JETAA International Committee, the meeting was also attended by delegates from JETAA chapters from all over the world, including Jamaica, America, France, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Brazil, Singapore and of course South Africa. JETAA Scotland, who hosted the conference, did a stellar job of not only ensuring the smooth running of the three day meeting itself, but also of showing all of the delegates the true meaning of Scottish hospitality.

The Consul General of Japan in Edinburgh, Masataka Tarahara, hosted a welcome dinner for the delegates at his residence (followed by a rousing solo performance of Susan Boyle's "I Dream a Dream"!), before JETAA Scotland introduced the group to some of Edinburgh's exciting nightlife. Clair also hosted a lavish reception, complete with traditional Scottish fair (and I can attest that haggis is indeed quite tasty), before we were encouraged to kick our heels up at a traditional celidh (dance) that had most of us breathless but exuberant by the end! Many of us also took the opportunity to do a little sightseeing on our own before and after the meeting with the general consensus being that Edinburgh is certainly an incredibly beautiful and fascinating city that begs to be revisited.

As well as a providing a wonderful way to connect with other JETAA members, the meeting also gave us an invaluable chance to swap ideas and success stories and to come up with new strategies and plans for our chapters going forward.

One of the most discussed topics at the 2010 meeting, however, revolved around

persistent rumours coming from Japan that the government was considering cancelling the JET Programme completely within the next couple of years. Representatives from Clair and MOFA, however, quashed the rumours, and assured us that the Japanese government – as yet – has no plans to cancel the programme. Due to the worsening Japanese economy, however, they have decided that budget cuts need to made, and in terms of alumni activities, there will now be no Clair funding available for purely social events (As JETAASA currently does not receive any funding from Clair, this does not affect our activities).

Also, sadly, as a result of the budget cuts, the 2010 JETAA International meeting will be the last of its kind for the foreseeable future. This has been a major blow to JETAA International, as the meeting is greatly valued as a means of connecting with its various international chapters and re-energising delegates with new enthusiasm and new ideas for their chapters back home. However, JETAA International will continue to function as it always has and all of the delegates at the 2010 meeting committed themselves to continued support and communication between their chapters in the year to come. In other words, we will all continue to Ganbarre!

The Japan Earthquake and Tsunami Relief Raffle

As the horrific images of the earthquake and tsunami that hit the Tohoku region of Japan began to be shown around the world, many of us watched in disbelief; devastated by what was happening in a country that showed so many of us such unbelievable hospitality and kindness during our years living there. I know that many of you felt – as I did – that you had to do something to help and so JETAASA immediately sprung into action and started a Japan Earthquake and Tsunami Raffle to raise money to contribute to the relief efforts.

The raffle prize – a Garmin Nuvi 1200 GPS – was kindly donated by the TCB Group, and many of our members offered to take raffle sheets to sell to friends and family members. All of the sheets and the money raised were collected by the 1st of April, and we were overwhelmed by the response. Special mention must go to Alan Gray, Hein de Vries, Stephanie Nel, Michelle Smith and Nuria Giralt for being our star raffle ticket sellers and bringing in a large portion of the money raised.



The draw was held on 4th April, when the lucky winner was announced as Claudio Rossi from Pretoria – congratulations Claudio!

The proceeds of the raffle were handed over to the Japanese Embassy on 5th April to be sent to aid the excellent work of the Japanese Red Cross. In the end, over 350 raffle were sold and the final amount of money raised was a wonderful R7,700, which we are truly thrilled about. Many of our members living overseas also generously donated directly to the Japanese Red Cross raising our contribution even higher – omedetou!
